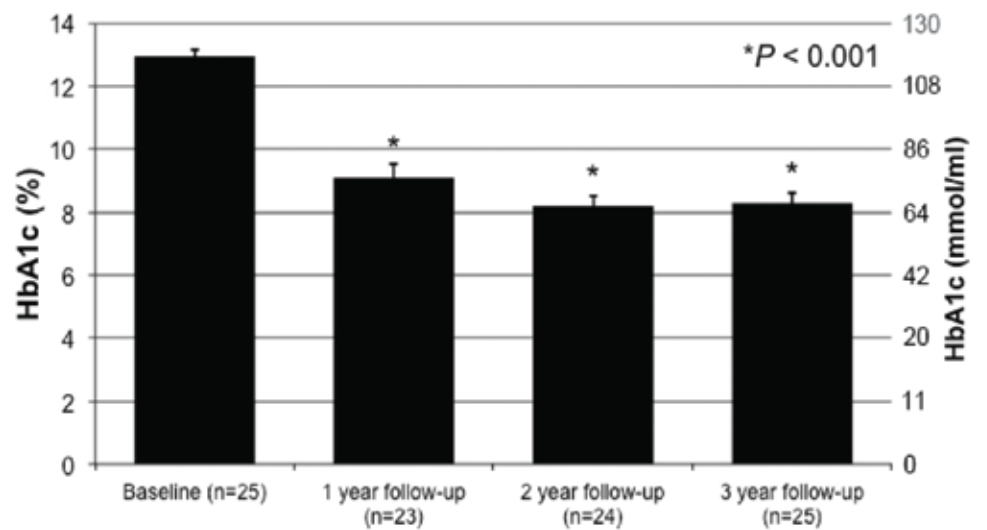

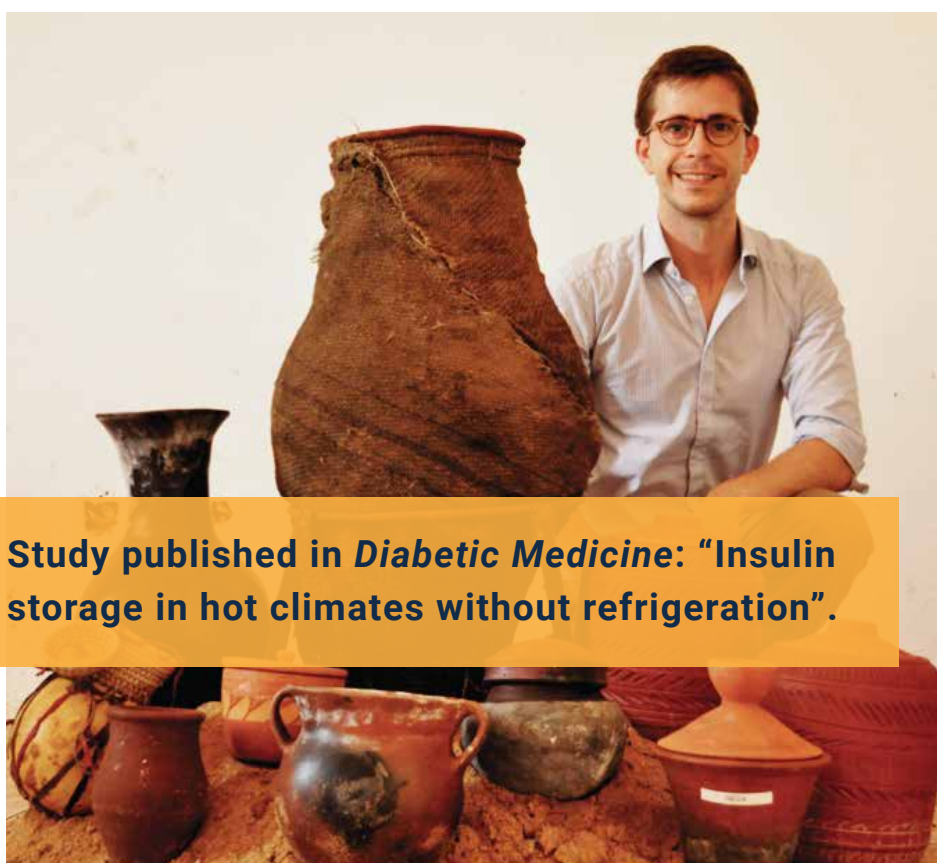
A seven year retrospective review shows an encouraging improvement in HbA1c for children supported by the program in Haridwar, India.

Camps held in Haiti, Democratic Republic of Congo, Guyana and Tanzania



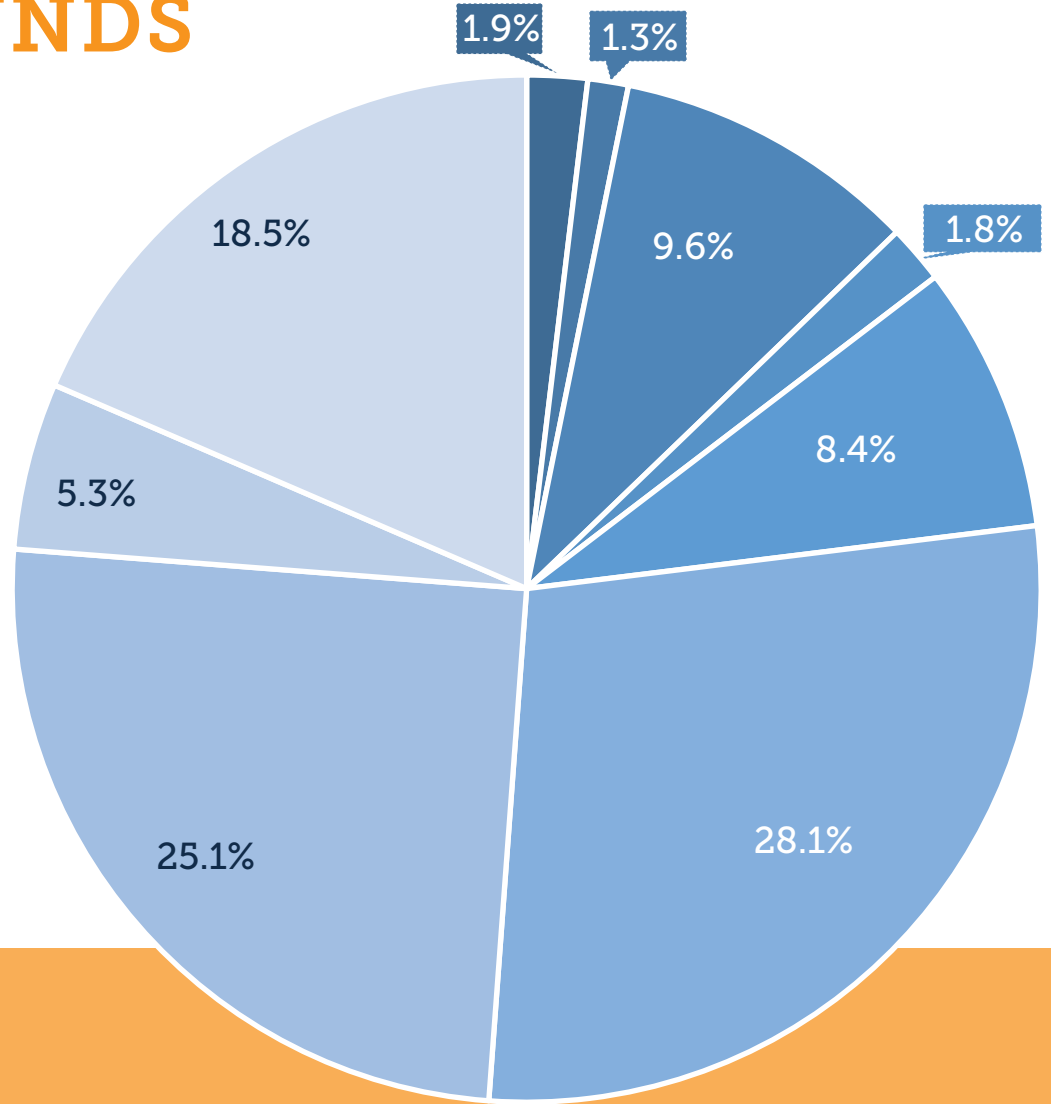
